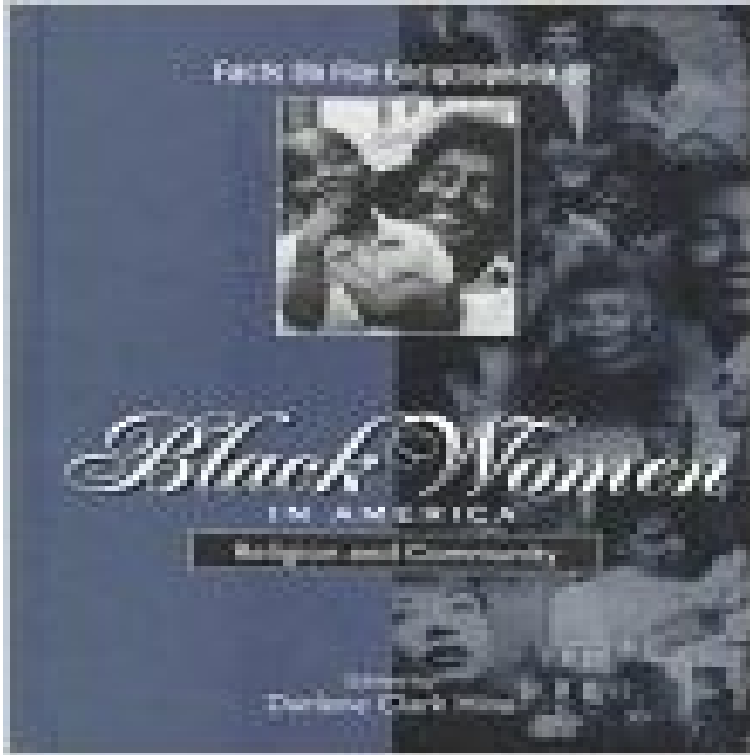


Black Women in America: Religion & Community (Facts on File Encyclopedia of Black Women in America)
